3. God may guide by stirring up your spirit

In the last lesson, we saw how each of the workers who restored the temple and Jerusalem teamed up with God to fulfill a piece of His will. The work started with Zerubbabel about 538 B.C. Remember how the Lord stirred up the workers' spirits?

So the Lord stirred up the spirit of Zerubbabel the son of Shealtiel, governor of Judah, and the spirit of Joshua the son of Jehozadak, the high priest, and the spirit of all the remnant of the people; and they came and worked on the house of the Lord of hosts, their God.

Haggai 1:14

The Hebrew word for stir, *ur*, is also translated “arouse,” “awaken,” or “move.” The *New Living Translation* says, “So the Lord sparked the enthusiasm of...”





Ur is used again in the book of Ezra.

Then the heads of fathers' households of Judah and Benjamin and the priests and the Levites arose, even everyone whose spirit God had stirred [ur] to go up and rebuild the house of the Lord which is in Jerusalem.

And all those about them encouraged them....

Ezra 1:5-6

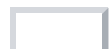
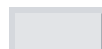
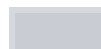
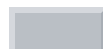
Which people did God lead to work on the restoration project?

The NIV answers, “Everyone whose heart God had moved.” Notice, God could have spoken to the people through a prophet or commanded them directly, but He did neither. Instead, He aroused an interest, a desire, a willingness within their spirits. Those whose hearts He “stirred” became motivated to put their hands to the work of rebuilding. Undoubtedly, they caught a vision for what could be done. The mental image of a new temple and a new city got them excited.

What captures your imagination? What excites you? What type of work would contribute to your desire to serve God and others? Could it be to

- assist in the healing process through nursing?
- build into the lives of students by teaching?
- help prepare accurate payroll and financial records as a bookkeeper or accountant?
- meet someone’s housing needs as a contractor, carpenter, electrician, plumber, painter, carpet layer?
- assist those whose jobs depend on computers as a computer technician or programmer?
- repair someone’s car so that they can get to their workplace by becoming a mechanic?

The list is endless.
